Chrismons, meaning "Christ monograms," traditionally are white and gold designs made from Christian symbols that signify Christ. Often displayed on an evergreen tree during the Christmas season, symbols such as stars, crosses, fish, crowns, and the alpha and omega remind us of Christ's identity, his story, and of the Holy Trinity.

Chrismons were first developed in 1957 by Frances Spencer and the women of the Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, VA.


Many churches today display a Chrismon tree during the Advent and Christmas season decorated with handmade ornaments.



I asked Doug about the reference to a "portion of the window". He said he believed it had been wider with more scenery. We speculated that, perhaps, part of the window had gotten damaged or broken in the moving process.

RECYCLING MISCONCEPTIONS

STYROFOAM PRODUCTS are not recyclable in curbside programs. Foam products can be bulky, lightweight, and easily contaminated with food, tape, and other residues that don't belong in recycling carts. PLASTIC BAGS AND FILM are not accepted in most curbside recycling programs. This is because they can tangle sorting machinery and are made with materials that cannot be easily separated. Instead, take these items to designated drop-off points at grocery stores or reuse them whenever possible to reduce waste.

single-use PLASTICS, also known as disposable plastics, are not accepted in your recycling cart. When possible, swap them for reusable options.



- Hazardous waste paint, aerosol or solvent cans, cleaners, pesticides/herbicides, flammables, poisons, fuel canisters/tanks, motor oil
- Building and automotive waste asbestos, treated wood, antifreeze, tires
- Medical weste needles, sharps, medicines, biohazardous materials

MAINTAINING YOUR ORGANICS CONTAINERS

KEEPING YOUR GREEN CART CLEAN

Maggots are fly larvae and occur when flies lay eggs on organic materials. This can occur in any cart where organic materials are placed (garbage or organics cart).

Maggots typically have a seven-day life cycle with fluctuations depending on temperatures and other conditions such as moisture.

To prevent maggets from occurring, eliminate odors, and reduce their access to the cart follow these tips:

- Wrap your meat food scraps and bones in a sheet of newspaper before placing them in your green organics cart.
- Freeze your seafood or meat scraps until the day prior to your collection day.
- Put a layer of yard trimmings, food-solled paper (nupkins or paper towels), or baking soda on top of your food scraps.
- Rinse your organics cert with a mild detergent and water.
- Keep the cart lid closed.
- Spray the rim of the cart with bleach, ammonia, or bug spray weekly.

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HOW TO MINIMIZE ODORS


If you would like to minimize odors from your green cart, the

following can help:

Mix food scraps with materials that are dry and absorbent (and also organic) such as plant debris, shredded bills and sensitive documents, and paper napkins or towels. Sprinkling baking soda in the cart can help for smaller amounts of food scraps too.



 Store your cart in a cooler, shady area so the heat doesn't increase the decomposition (and smell) of the contents of the cart.



MAGGOTS IN YOUR GREEN ORGANICS CART?

If you end up with maggets in your green organics cort, the following can help:

- Spray the top and inside of the cart with vinegar.
- Cover the maggots with lime, salt, or vinegar.



HOW TO CLEAN YOUR GREEN ORGANICS CART

If you need to clean your green organics cart, do not use soap and other "cleaners" that could damage local ecosystems. Instead use natural methods and ingredients such as:

- Leave the cart lid open on a rainy day or rinse out the cart with a hose. Make sure to dump the used water and organics debris in landscaping (not into the storm drain).
- Try lime or lemon, baking soda, and vinegar inside the cart to clean and scrub away odors.

DO NOT RECYCLE OR COMPOST THESE ITEMS

These items are often mistakenly put in the recycling bin. Placing them in the compost or recycling container is a contamination violation.

- All plastic bags, packaging, utensila, and straws are garbago. Even if they have a "recycling symbol" on them they are not recyclable.
- 2. Polystyrene packaging, cups, plates, block, or to-go containers are not allowed in the recycle or organic cart.
- 3. Clothes/textiles cannot be recycled in your recycling cart. They can be recycled/down-cycled by donating them to a non-profit.

Batteries are hazardous waste and can cause a fire in our trucks and/or the processing facility If disposed of incorrectly. You can dispose of batteries at most home improvement stores or visit the Hazardous Waste Facility at the Recology Transfer Station at 2720 South Fifth Avenue, in Oroville, Monday to Friday 8 AM to 4 PM and Saturday 8 AM to 4:30 PM. FREE MATTRESS DROP OFF

Residents can drop off up to 3 mattresses and/or box springs free of charge all year long at the Recology Transfer Station at 2720 South Fifth Avenue, in Oroville, Monday to Friday 8 AM to 4 PM and Saturday 8 AM to 4:30 PM.



BENEFIT'S OF COMPOSTING

Composting is nature's way of recycling and is one of the most powerful actions we can take to reduce landfill waste, combat climate change, and build healthy soil. It supports the environment by:

- Reducing methane emissions: Composting organic waste lowers methane output from landfills.
- Decreasing waste: Diverts organic material from landfills.
- Recycling nutrients: Compost transforms organic waste into nutrient-rich soil.

Using compost in your backyard, local farms, schools, parks, and other green spaces replenishes the soil with essential organic matter.

HOW TO PREPARE FOOD SCRAPS FOR COLLECTION

1. Collect food scraps while preparing meals, scraping plates, and/or cleaning out the refrigerator of spoiled food. Include paper towels, napkins, paper plates, and pizza boxes (make sure to dispose of any plastic in the garbage).



2. Empty your kitchen compost pail, including soiled paper, and any vegotativo waste into your green compost cart. No plastic bogs are allowed in the green compost cart.



3. We'll take it from here! We haul your compost to a local facility and within 60 days, it is made into rich compost that is used throughout the community and beyond to help regenerate the soil.



FREE INDOOR FOOD SCRAP PAILS

Free indoor compost pails are available to Oraville residents (one per household) for the collection of food scraps in your kitchen. Please contact City of Oroville at recycle@cityoforoville.org to request a pail.

COFFEEHOUR

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

A coffee hour is provided after the 10:30 AM service by volunteers of the church. The church will provide coffee, tea, water, creamer, sweeteners, cups, plates, napkins, silverware, drink concentrate and ice.

Those who volunteer for running the coffee hour will provide snacks and those who volunteer on the first Sundays will provide cupcakes for that months birthdays

Those who volunteer on potluck Sunday only needs to provide the beverages but are welcome to bring snacks to add to the potluck.

Volunteers will make the coffee, tea, and punch and set it out on the table provided along with snacks.

Please make both Reg(Black coffee maker) & Decaf (gray coffee maker) Some members can't have the caffeine. Coffee maker instructions on cabinet above coffee makers.

Volunteers will remove all items, clean up the dishes and table, and place items used in their normal storage areas. They will also wash towels used and bring them back to the church towel drawer.

Procedure:

Randy Fowler will purchase the provided items listed above and place these supplies in their appropriate areas for coffee hour access.

Alma Short will set up a sign up sheet for volunteers to run the coffee hour on each Sunday throughout the year, remind volunteers of their designated coffee hour Sunday, and orient new volunteers on the policies and procedures regarding coffee hour responsibilities including where supplies are kept.

Volunteers on their designated coffee hour Sunday will:

- A. Make a pot of regular and decaf coffee and put them on an activated warmer plate.
- B. Make the punch in a punch bowl or glass pitchers (whichever is easier for you) with water and ice, and place it on the serving table.
- C. Place the plates, cups, napkins, silverware, creamer, and sweeteners on the serving table.
- D. Place their snacks on plates on the serving table with appropriate serving utensils.
- E. Monitor the table as people come through the serving line and assist as needed.
- F. After serving is completed clean the coffee pots, punch bowl, and other utensils and dishes used for the coffee hour and return them to their storage areas.
- G. Turn off the coffee maker. Unplug and put away warmer plates (once cooled down).
- H. Clean the Serving table and counters used.
- I. Notify person in charge of purchasing what coffee hour supplies need to be replenished after checking the cabinets in the janitorial room, pantry by the handicap bathroom or the cabinets in the handicap bathroom hallway.

<u>The United Methodist Advent Quiz</u> <u>Answers</u>

- The correct answer is all of the above. Advent calendars originated in Germany in the mid19th century. The tradition began with families drawing a chalk line on the door for each day of December. An Advent Clock was one way people marked the time, as well as lighting Advent candles, one for each day. Families also hung up a new image every day before Christmas.
- 2 The correct answer is <u>circles symbolize</u> <u>eternity</u>. Circles, because they have no beginning and no end. The wreath, a circle of evergreens (another symbol of eternity), is a reminder during Advent of our waiting for the eternal to come into our midst.
- 3 The correct answer is "Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus." In this hymn, Charles Wesley captured the anticipation of the people of Israel who for hundreds of years longed for the coming of the Messiah.
- The correct answer is <u>false</u>. The season of Advent, which comes from the Latin word "adventus," meaning "coming" or "visit," begins four Sundays before Christmas and ends on Christmas Eve. When Christmas Day is on a Sunday, the first Sunday of Advent is on a Sunday, so there are four full weeks to the season. If Christmas is on any other day, the total number of Advent days will vary between 22 and 27.
- The Correct answer is approximately 100 miles. The Gospel of Luke tells us that Gabriel visited Mary in Nazareth (Luke 1:26), telling her she would give birth to Jesus. Mary then traveled to the home of her relative Elizabeth, who Luke tells us lived in Judea (Luke 1:39). Tradition says that Elizabeth and Zechariah probably lived in Hebron, nearly 100 miles from Nazareth. It would have taken Mary about a week to make the journey on foot.

- 6 The correct answer is a representation of Jesus' family tree. The Jesse Tree takes its name from the prophecy of Isaiah 11:1, "A shoot will grow up from the stump of Jesse; a branch will sprout from his roots" (CEB). This prophecy links the messiah to King David whose father was Jesse. Jesse Trees are decorated with special symbols used to tell the stories of Jesus' ancestors from creation through Jesus' birth.
- 7 The correct answer is arrival or coming. The Latin word "adventus" means "coming." As the Book of Worship points out, the season proclaims the comings of the Christ - whose birth we prepare to celebrate once again, who comes continually in Word and Spirit, and whose return in final victory we anticipate.
- 8 The correct answer is pink (or rose) is a color of joy. The rose candle is a symbol of joy. Advent is traditionally a season of penitence and a time for preparing our hearts. The third Sunday of Advent focuses on the joy we find in Christ.
- 9 The correct answer is <u>John Wesley</u>, who started Watch Night services in 1740, presumably as an alternative to times of drunken revelry such as Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve. It is included in the United Methodist Book of Worship. Wesley believed that Methodists and all Christians should reaffirm their covenant with God annually.
- 10 The correct answer is <u>God with us</u>. In Hebrew, the term "Emmanuel" means "God with us."
